Exciting times for our Lithgow campus

MitCon music programs in the Lithgow LGA are going from strength to strength! ZigZag Public School Band is in its 2nd term of tuition with Marc Brown and is making great musical strides. The Band has 10 keen students playing a range of brass and woodwind instruments.

But that's not all! Chords for Connection (pictured) free electric guitar tuition at Lithgow High School commenced in week 3, and five lucky Lithgow High School year 7 and 8 students are receiving weekly 30-minute individual lessons plus a 45-minute group session from Trevor Baker, right through to the end of 2023.



This initiative is fully funded by the Energy Australia NSW Mt Piper Community Grant Program; students are provided with tuition at no cost, plus a Yamaha electric guitar package and all accessories and resources required. On completion of the semester they get to keep the instruments. Many thanks to David McLeod for his work in securing this funding.

We continue to receive great feedback from schools in the Lithgow LGA with active programs being delivered in Lithgow LGA small schools – thanks to Gaye Thomas and Marc Brown. St Patrick's Lithgow students and parents continue to engage with music tuition across a range of instruments – special thanks to Frances Mcleod, Graeme Hunt and Gaye Thomas. Pete Armstrong is teaching a number of guitar students at Cooerwull Public and Lithgow Public. Outside of School activity at the Lithgow premises includes Individual Tuition, Music Therapy Groups, Performance coaching for the HSC and advanced exams, Lithgow City Orchestra rehearsals and occasional workshops. MitCon teacher profile -<u>Samantha Schoeler-Jones</u>

Samantha Schoeler-Jones has been teaching flute at Mitchell Conservatorium since 2007, but what do we really know about her? Read on to find out...

Samantha completed a Bachelor of Music
Performance degree at Western Australian
Conservatorium of Music with Richard Gill (OAM) as
Dean in 1991. During her time in Perth she performed
with the West Australian Symphony Orchestra.

In 1995 Samantha was accepted into the Franz Liszt Hochschule für Musik in Weimar, Germany, to complete further studies with Professor Robert Winn, former Principal Flautist of the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, London. In 1997 she moved to Berlin to study Music Therapy at the Insitut für Musiktherapie. Returning to Australia in 2004 Samantha decided to combine her experience as a music therapist with music education and completed a Diploma in Secondary Education. Between 2007 and 2017 she worked as a classroom music specialist in the Blue Mountains with the Department of Education, teaching recorder ensembles in a number of schools in the Blue Mountains, as well as conducting choir and school band programs. In 2016 Samantha was invited to become a mentor for the National Music Teachers Mentoring Program under the auspices of the late Richard Gill OAM. A major highlight for Samantha during her employment with the Education Departmen was to be invited to conduct 700 recorders for the Festival of Instrumental Music at the Sydney Opera House in 2014 and 2015. Presently Samantha divides her time between teaching flute and recorder at the Mitchell Conservatorium and being employed as a Registered Music Therapist (RMT) in South West Sydney, supporting vulnerable families and children and providing professional development in the early childhood sector. Further to this Samantha specialises in early intervention supporting neuro-divergent children and children with disabilities 0-12yrs.
