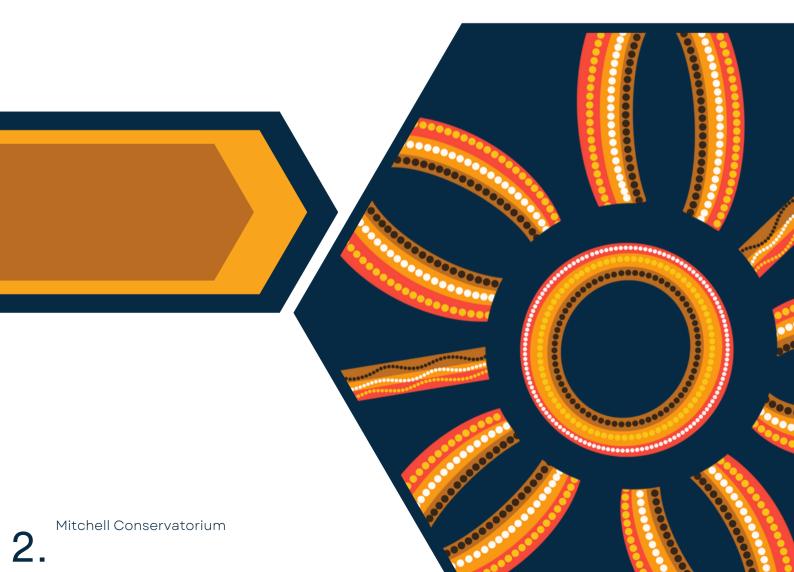

# Acknowledgement of Country

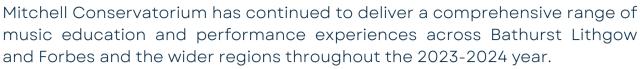

### **Executive Directors Report**

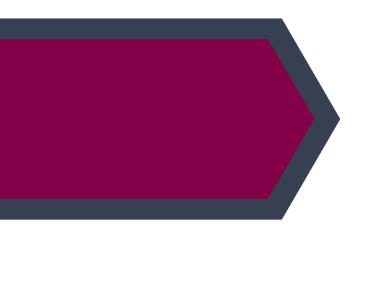
### **Executive Director Andrew Smith**



As a member of the Association of NSW Regional Conservatoriums, Mitchell Conservatorium receives funding from the NSW Department of Education via the Regional Conservatorium Grants Program (RCGP). In 2023-2024, funding of almost \$500,000 was received, and utilised to provide music education programs and performances, as well as contributing to the administrative management of the school. This funding also assisted with costs associated with the organisation's insurances, utilities, and maintenance.

In addition, a further grant of \$4,000 from the Department of Education was received by Mitchell Conservatorium to support fee relief. This funding has bolstered the conservatorium's scholarship and bursary programs ensuring affordable tuition for a growing number of students. Mitchell Conservatorium is grateful for the funding received through the RCGP, and for the positive relationship the conservatorium holds with the Department of Education as we work together to bring music education and performance to regional communities across the state.

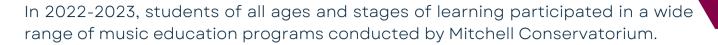
This report aims to highlight the work of our dedicated staff, students, and volunteers who demonstrate commitment and enthusiasm for music and the value it holds in our community and in our lives.





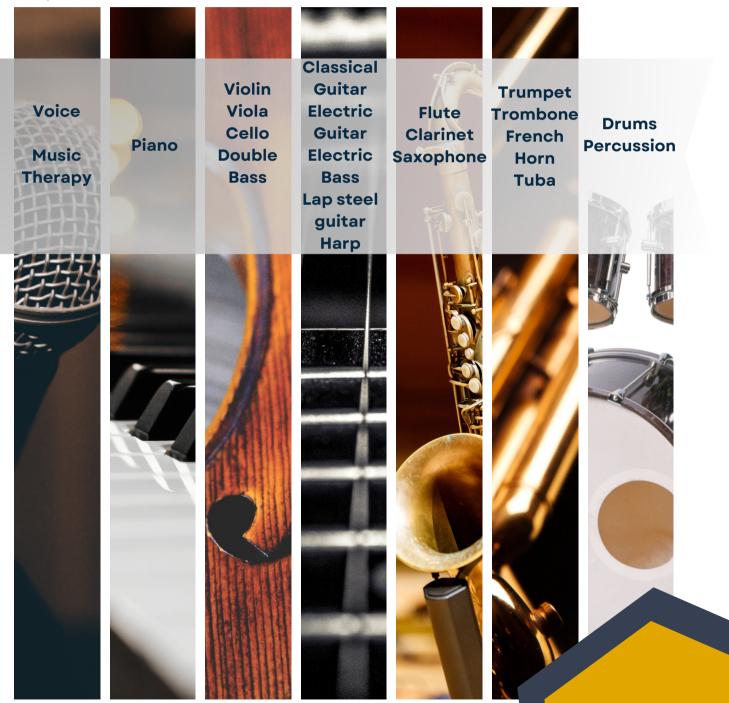

#### **Ensembles and Classes**

Mitchell Conservatorium has continued to consolidate and expand the Ensemble programs and offer performance opportunities for all students and participants. Our Early Childhood classes have expanded to four sessions per week with waiting lists for most sessions. The establishment of Connections Big Band and Blue Attribute Jazz ensemble has been very successful and both groups are performing regularly throughout Bathurst and the surrounding regions.

The Bathurst Chamber Orchestra under the directorship of Dr David Hood has developed a solid repertoire and they have presented some quality concerts. The flow on affect to the other string ensembles has seen an increase in musical development and membership. Dr Hood has also made significant progress with developing the Concert Band with a refocus on adults with limited musical performance experience. Our Rock ensembles, vocal groups and ukulele group are also enjoying an increase in participation. Surveys conducted in 2023 indicate a high level of satisfaction with our ensemble programs.

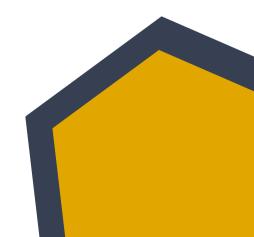
### Visiting artists and workshops

The focus of Mitchell Conservatorium and the affiliated regional arts groups has been on re-establishing our local performance opportunities which are still recovering from the COVID shutdown, so visiting artist sponsorship had been limited.

We did however sponsor and participate in some larger visiting events:

This event had been running for ten years at Port Macquarie and bands from Bathurst have always had a strong presence at the event. Mitchell Conservatorium will continue to work with the Big Band Blast committee to develop this event and to foster Big Band music in the Bathurst Community.





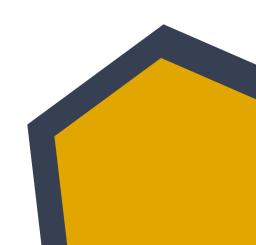

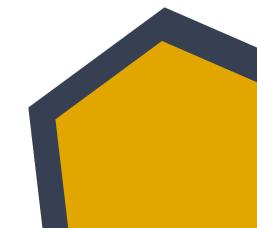

### **Professional development**

Staff members Kait Milgate, Kaitlyn Baker and Andrew Smith attended two days of Pedagogy workshops in Wagga on November 17-18. This proved to be an enlightening and motivating experience for all involved and we were able to report back and share this new and valuable information at our Staff development Day on January 24.





### **Financials**

There are some key developments in the financial statements which are noteworthy:

- Administration wages are down on the previous year by \$60,000 and down on budget by \$34000 due to an administration restructure.
- Bank Interest was up by \$21000 on the previous year and up by \$22000 on budget as interest rates have increased.
- An un-factored Energy Australia Grant of \$8400 was received.
- An un-factored increase in Department of Education grant income received was \$10000 over budget.
- Tuition income was up by \$67000 on previous year and up by \$22000 on budget (fee increase and growth) however, tuition wages were also \$9000 above budget with External Tuition also above budget by \$10k.
- Repairs and Maintenance was down \$31000 on budget. The piano refurbishment cost of \$27600 was included in the budget as a Repair and Maintenance, however the auditors deemed it should be capitalised.



### **Marketing and Publicity**

The appointment of Dr David Hood as Website Manager has resulted in a complete reworking of the site. This is an ongoing work in progress, but surveys indicate that this new and more user-friendly structure has been received favourably with over 95% of positive responses.

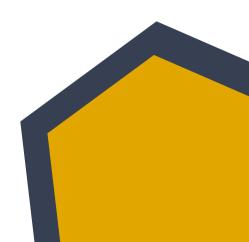
Social media has also been revamped under the stewardship of Kaitie Baker who has taken the initiative of developing featured teacher profiles. This has resulted in inquiries and increased lesson uptake for featured teachers. Teacher podcast interviews are also in development.

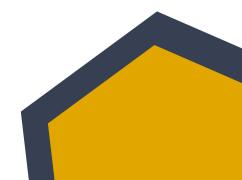


### Mitchell Conservatorium Annual General Meeting 25 March 2024

### Net Profit

The Net Profit for the year 2023 was \$99,889 versus \$25,179 for 2022. This was an improvement of \$74,710 over the 2022 result, as shown in the table below.

It is pleasing to see and improvement in Net Profit for the year 2023. The amount of profit is also comfortable in terms of being a not-for-profit organisation.

The Balance shows Net Assets for 31 December 2023 to be \$1,167,977 versus \$1,068,088 for 2022. This is an improvement of \$99,889.

The main differences are as follows:

Current Assets Cash/ Investments \$839,701 versus \$707,939 (variance \$131,732)

Current Liabilities Trade & other payables \$120,439 versus \$85,842 (variance \$34,597)

The 2023 current assets are higher than 2022 by some \$151,377, largely due an increase in cash and cash equivalents.

The 2023 Current Liabilities are higher than 2022 by some \$45,808, largely due to Trades and other payables.

The balance sheet is healthy with adequate cash reserves and with low liabilities.

The financial ratios all appear to be healthy. They are all influenced by the Current Assets (cash position) which is healthy.

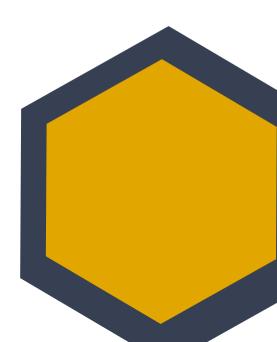
### 4. Summary December 2022

The year 2023 has sown a comfortable Net profit which has also seen an improvement over 2022. This has been due to income increasing by some \$102,928 with expenses increasing by only \$28,218.

The Balance Sheet is also healthy shows increased Net Assets over 2022. Current Assets (cash position) are also healthy (\$899,314) and higher than 2022.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

#### 1. BASIS OF PREPARATION

This financial report is a special purpose financial reportprepared in order tosatisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012, Associations Incorporation Act (NSW) 2009 and Associations Incorporation Regulation (NSW) 2010and for use by the committee and members of the association. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The report isprepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and except where stated does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

If unearned income is recognised as a related amount above, the Association recognises income in profit or loss when or as it satisfies its obligations under the contract.

#### (b) Income Tax

The Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 exempts the association from income tax. Consequently, no provision for income tax is required and the principles of tax effect accounting have not been adopted.

#### (c) Fixed assets

Land and building are initially recognised at deemed cost and subsequently measured on the cost basis. Other fixed assets are carried at cost, less where applicable, any accumulated depreciation. The depreciable amounts of all assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

#### 3. ECONOMIC DEPENDENCY

The association receives a major part of its income from government departments. Consequently, it is economically dependent on the continuation of these grants to maintain sustainability.

#### 4. RENTAL EXPENSE

This expense in the majority is for the use of external halls and rooms used by Mitchell Conservatorium Inc for teaching. Rental expense paid for the 2023year included premises located at Bathurst, Forbes and Parkes.

#### 5. UNEXPENDED FRIENDS LEVY

This is an amount received on behalf of the Friends of the Conservatorium. Equivalent to a school P & C, the Friends committee comprises of parents of students and interested community members, who will assist students of the Conservatorium by supporting its programs through the use of the funds generated from the family levy. At year end, a total of \$13,883(2022-\$10,019)hadbeen raised via the family levy but not yet spent. These funds are available for use by the Conservatorium in future years. The Friends committee waswound up during the 2023financial year.
